

The Intersections of Geography, Engineering, and Narrative: A Technical Analysis of Kathleen Cambor's *In Sunlight, in a Beautiful Garden*

Mathematical Modeling of the Breach

The failure of the South Fork Dam can be modeled using the **Breach Outflow Hydrograph**. When the water began to overtop the earthen breast, it initiated **headcut erosion** on the downstream face. The volume of the Lake Conemaugh reservoir was approximately 20 million tons of water (roughly 4.8 billion gallons). The potential energy (\$PE\$) released can be calculated by the formula:

$$PE = mgh$$

Where: **m** = mass of the water (approx. 1.81×10^{10} kg) **g** = acceleration due to gravity (9.81 m/s²) **h** = height of the dam (approx. 22 meters)

This massive release of energy translated into a wall of water and debris moving at speeds exceeding 40 miles per hour, carrying everything from locomotives to entire houses, a force that Cambor describes with haunting, musical prose.
